Our Pre-Wedding Ritual for Sharyn June 9, 1994

What we are doing today is in the tradition of the wedding shower, with a difference. We have not gathered here to make you, Sharyn, rich in material gifts. Rather we want to add to your spiritual wealth before you set out on the long road of marriage.

Today we will talk about a "virgin". We use the word in its original sense, meaning "independent of a man." It seems contradictory then to be celebrating the coming together of a woman and a man. But this is appropriate today when women of all walks of life, of all ages, of every sexual preference, must struggle with how to grow free of the rules, traditions, and values of men.

Therefore, one purpose of this pre-wedding rite is to strengthen and reaffirm the commitment of the women's community to you the bride, and to help you find ways to be a "virgin woman" as well as a married woman. We, as your bride community, provide the context within which you can struggle with your status as woman and Jew, within marriage and a relationship, and a s a biological and spiritual mother. This first series of readings from <u>Mediations For Women Who Do Too Much</u> by Anne Wilson Schaef, signals to all of us present that it is our right and obligation to help you maintain your individuality as you deepen your commitment to Dennis.

Purification by Water/Mikveh

At the first moment, when God created heavens and earth, the earth was the depths and God's spirit saturated the waters. Then God separated the waters, above and beneath. (Genesis 1:1-8) Like the separation of the waters, we distinguish between one moment and another in the flow of time. In some moments we are conscious of transformation and re-enter the waters of separation for renewal.

Reflecting and altering our consciousness of our act of immersion, we say two b'rachot to separate the moment.

Holy One of Blessing, Your presense swells creation with the waters of life.

The Shehechayanu uses its recognition of our threefold relationship to God for each of the three traditional immersions: (While dipping)

Shehecheyanu: the life-force which flows in and through us. Vekiyamanu: the trust and sustenance on which we rest, and can allow ourselves in float.

Vehigiyanu lazman hazeh: the movement which carries our lives onward in time.
